Purpose



Q2. How would describe your experience in obtaining resources and/or support from CADR?



Not useful at all; I felt unsupported or the services were inadequate.	3




Q5. Are you using your accommodations in your courses?



Addressing Feedback Themes

Provide instructor and student reminders on how to find a list of approved accommodations

When students are initially approved for academic accommodations, a instructor notification email is also sent to the list of instructors for student's registered courses at that time. In the body of the email, there are instructions for those course instructors on how to find the approved accommodations in Banner.

Students can find how to locate their approved accommodations in Banner in their provided Letter of Academic Accommodations. On CADR's Academic Accommodations webpage, there is a section titled "View, Renew, or Change Accommodations", which has a drop-down tab that provides information on how to view approved accommodations.

Provide education opportunities for instructors to learn about the importance of discussing accommodations with a student in a course

CADR, working with the Reinert Center for Transformative Teaching and Learning, has developed a learning opportunity for instructors to engage in. This learning opportunity covers the basics of the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) and Amendments Act (ADAAA), it's meaning in purpose in a higher education context, what is means for SLU, and how it impacts a course instructor. The opportunity also covers universal design in the section half, engaging instructors on how to use universal design as a pedagogy when constructing a course.

Display information on how to use DocuSign with accommodation forms

DocuSign, the online document process, is currently being used by CADR for all office documents and accommodation forms. For assistance with

DocuSign, CADR has provided how-to videos and user guides on the office website, specifically for using the Out of Class Testing (OCT) Form and Rescheduled Exam Request (RER Form). Since these are the most widely used forms, these videos and guides are readily available.
